

Laguna Foundation Board of Directors Pledges \$100,000 Matching Grant

For 25 years, the Laguna Foundation has provided the necessary leadership critical to conserving and restoring the Laguna de Santa Rosa. To insure that the Foundation has the financial resources to continue its work, Raini Sugg, Board President of the Laguna de Santa Rosa Foundation, announced that she and every member of the Laguna Board are combining efforts to contribute a **\$100,000 matching grant**. They will match all gifts made by December 31, dollar for dollar, up to \$100,000. This means a donation of \$100 will result in a gift of \$200. Even better, they will match **all gifts of \$1,000 or more on a two-to-one basis**. That means a gift of \$1,000 results in \$3,000 for the Laguna de Santa Rosa!

Raini and the Board are making this special gift because they believe deeply that the health of the Laguna affects everyone. "Protecting and restoring the Laguna cannot wait," says Raini. "Degradation due to habitat fragmentation, water pollution, and urban development continues. A clean and adequate supply of water for people, wildlife, birds, and agriculture is critical. It is so important for our staff to be proactive, but the work depends on a sustainable funding source of private capital. Private philanthropy is the key."



Your donation will provide year-round access for people of all ages to hike, kayak, and walk the Laguna.

The 254-square-mile Laguna watershed stretches from Windsor to Cotati, from the top of the Mayacamas Mountains to Forestville, where the Laguna joins the Russian River and flows into the ocean. We all must invest in saving the Laguna. The Laguna Foundation staff, with the help of hundreds of volunteers, will put your gift and the match to work immediately to:

- Expand efforts to restore the 22-mile Laguna waterway.
- Provide abundant habitat for wildlife.
- Maintain a permanent healthy flyway and recuperating zone for migrating birds.
- Insure opportunities to hike, kayak, bicycle and walk.
- Educate and inspire people of all ages to protect forever the Laguna through outings and workshops, public access, trail maintenance, and our school program "Learning Laguna."



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Executive Director Report

In the 2014 Autumn issue, we were looking forward to winter rains and the beautiful changes the rain brings to our ecosystems. This year the anticipation is tinged with some worry. In the 3rd year of a recordsetting drought, we at the Foundation, along with our partners and supporters, are deeply concerned. What happens if the drought persists for yet another winter? Is the persistent high pressure system over the Pacific that is stopping the rains from coming south an effect of global climate change? Is our winter weather pattern seen over the last few years the new normal?

These are tough questions, and while we don't have all of the answers, we know for sure that wetland ecosystems must have water. No water means no functioning wetland ecosystem which means dramatically reduced biodiversity. This year we are REALLY hoping for a wet winter. I encourage everyone to conserve water and carbon consumption. Our little speck in space, our planet, and the Laguna de Santa Rosa, need all the help we can get!

Along with our conservation efforts, let's think positive thoughts and remember that even during this last "dry" winter we had a few storms that filled up the floodplain. Last year, I was lucky enough to be at the Laguna Environmental Center on Feb. 9th for one of our great supporters, Mike Shepherd's, birthday party. According to the stream gauge on the Occidental Road bridge, the Laguna rose more than 10-feet! Water was everywhere, and where water goes so goes wildlife. Mergansers, American White Pelicans, Buffleheads, Great Egrets, Great Blue Herons, and many more bird species were all evident. We even spotted a few teenage boys surfing behind a pickup truck on the flooded Sanford Road! Let's hope for more storms like that this winter!

When the rains come, our covered observation deck here at the LEC is a great place to be. The views are fabulous! If the Laguna swells with enough water, I will again be staging flash fundraising kayak trips. When conditions are just right, I'll send out an email inviting the first 15 or so people who respond to go kayaking from a private drop-in location. We supply everything, and the cost is only \$100! Make sure we have your email address if you are interested in coming along. For those who are interested in learning more about how to navigate the floodplain and where the best spots to go are, I will be hosting my annual talk and slideshow on kayaking and hiking the Laguna on Saturday, Jan. 10 at 3pm. River Parkways, Southern Laguna Restoration Project Update

If you participated in the April 2013 Laguna Re-Leaf Day project, then you know the site, or at least you know the part of the site that is nearest to the Laguna Main Wastewater Treatment Plant on Llano Road. The truth is, the Re-Leaf project was involved in about 1/8 of the total project area, . . .and then we kept going. The Laguna Foundation planted half of the project area in the Winter and Spring of 2013 and we finished the other half of the planting in Spring of 2014. The Southern Laguna restoration site goes almost all the way between Stony Point Road to Llano Road. That is nearly 1.7 miles of uninterrupted riparian forest restoration!

We planted the Laguna-appropriate trees and shrubs that are found in nearby remnant riparian habitats, such as valley oak, Oregon ash, box elder, Fremont cottonwood, red and yellow willows,

blue elderberry, California rose, and California blackberry. We also included some non-woody but very ecologically important plants and grasses, including narrow-leaf milkweed, basket sedge, soap root lily, creeping wild rye, and mugwort. The trees and shrubs are thriving in the rich soil that gets a healthy dose of nutrients every time the site floods (which is almost every year). Some of these non-woody plants are showing immediate positive impacts on wildlife. For the past two summers we have seen the milkweed grow vigorously, attracting many flying insects and butterflies, and hosting monarch butterfly caterpillars!

Like most of the Foundation's restoration projects, this one involves a team. We are funded by a State of California grant through the River Parkways Grant Program and the Sonoma County Water Agency, who provided the project area and will also be building a trail—stay tuned for more on that! The City of Santa Rosa chipped in by providing hookups, tech support and water from their reclaimed water system.

The school year got off to a great start in September with two “brush-up” events for Docents: Breakfast in the Laguna and Classroom Catch-up. At Breakfast we come together for a lovely picnic and walk around the field trip site sharing tips and techniques for successful interactions and learning experiences for the students. Classroom Catch-up provides an opportunity to share advice & practice with the special Learning Laguna classroom activities: the Wetland Model, Migration Game, Bird Investigation Station, Who Am I? and Animal Tracks.

Also in preparation for the field trips, docents braved the water and got thoroughly covered in mud when they tackled and removed some *Ludwigia* from the Laguna so students could see open water and study aquatic food webs. (And, we needed a place to catch crayfish for up-close examination!) After all the teaching materials were restocked, organized and refreshed we were all set to go to the first classroom visit on September 9th.

Twenty-two classroom visits, 22 field trips and 602 students and lots of “Wows!” later, programs concluded on October 23rd.

When we receive student thank you letters that say things like: “I am going to take my family back to the Laguna so they can see the animal footprints and all the birds and I can teach them everything I learned!” we know Learning Laguna is essential in inspiring a love of the Laguna and creating the next generation of stewards.


Nurture the Next Generation of Naturalists

The Laguna Foundation Celebrates Our 25th Year Anniversary

The Laguna de Santa Rosa Foundation is proud to announce that 2015 will be the 25th Anniversary of the beginning of our work to restore, conserve, and inspire public appreciation of the Laguna de Santa Rosa.

Historically, migratory birds and butterflies, indigenous wildlife, plants, trees, and generations of humankind all had a home in the Laguna. Over time however, human activity has degraded and diminished the waterways.

There were no overarching regulatory conditions set for the Laguna and no coordinated planned use uniting the various interests in the Laguna resources. By the late 1980s, the healthy waterways, usable land, flora, and fauna were all in danger of disappearing.

In the mid 1980s, the City of Sebastopol formed a Citizen's Advisory Committee to look into the challenges, opportunities, and natural gifts these complex water and land zones held for all life in the area. By 1989, early studies by the committee were completed and a landmark State of the Laguna Conference was held in Sebastopol. The Conference included Laguna neighbors, politicians, environmentalists, real estate brokers, farmers, and educators. The public stimulation this conference fostered led to the creation of The Laguna de Santa Rosa Foundation, which was officially incorporated in 1990. On World Wetlands Day in 2011, the Ramsar Convention named the Laguna de Santa Rosa Wetland Complex as a Wetland of International Importance. According to their website, the Laguna is considered a biological hotspot with rare and unique wetlands ecosystems and their associated rare and endemic plant and animal populations. The Laguna also provides flood control, scenic beauty, and recreation services to the majority of Sonoma County's human population.

To date, the Foundation has planted and

fostered more than 15,000 native trees, shrubs, and grasses. These native plants have widened riparian zones, shading and cooling sections of the Laguna and its tributaries on the Santa Rosa Plain with benefits to limiting the spread of the invasive weed *Ludwigia*, improvements in water quality, wildlife habitat and migration, as well as its natural beauty. The Laguna supports over 200 bird species as well as numerous mammals and reptiles. The additional habitat created through our restoration programs add and improve much needed habitat. New stream-side forests have led to increased numbers of wildlife such as river otter, American Mink, mountain lion, deer, and fox. Migratory bird flocks sheltering here

in winter have increased in number and indigenous bird life is flourishing. Through our Learning Laguna program, more than 13,800 school children have had first-hand classroom education and field trips to the Laguna. In 2012, Heron Hall at the Laguna Environmental Center was completed. Since then, more than 5,000 visitors have participated in the open house events and the regularly held talks, walks, and classes.

The Foundation survives today through grants to our restoration, conservation science, and education programs, and through the generous donations of the public. Thank you for your support and showing your love of the Laguna.

The 25th Anniversary Year celebrations will begin with the joint exhibit and celebration described below. Additional events will be announced as the year unfolds. Watch for more in *Meanderings* or on our website.


